## Covid 19 - local support, help & information

Although there is some relaxation of lockdown, people are gradually returning to work and it is good to know that some children are attending school there are still many restrictions on daily life. Everyone's situation is different and there are many people who require support and help. Reigate & Banstead Borough **Council** are working with local agencies and has compiled a database of local support services for residents. This is now on their website and can be viewed as an interactive map or as a directory of services

Services are delivered by community support groups, charities or businesses. The range of services currently include:

- good neighbour help such as shopping, picking up prescriptions, dog walking
- physical and mental wellbeing support, such as welfare calls, group activities, advice on domestic abuse and counselling
- financial advice, such as claiming benefits and government support, debt advice
- food and welfare support, such as accessing hot meals and foodbanks

Local food banks are working hard in the current crisis to provide home delivery for those needing support. **Note:** current venues and times are different.

Anyone can face hard times. Anyone can struggle to make ends meet. Food banks provide emergency help to those in crisis and are for local people in need.

## Can the Covid lockdown teach us to live better?

Do you find you are walking or cycling more? Would you say that you have appreciated spring and summer more this year with less traffic, commuting, school stress, and noise? Though Covid-19 is a deadly killer that is terrorising the world with fear and tragedy, trying to protect each other has meant that we have to live differently, and that is leading people to ask: Can we take the best of how we've been living in lockdown in Surrey, and hold on to it?

Funnily enough, one of the things our Church was going to promote in March – if it had been open and able to get people together – was Laudato Si, Pope Francis's document, which may be the teaching he is most remembered for in centuries to come. It is all about care for our planet, all of God's creation, including its people. It is

based on St Francis' prayer Laudato Si that praises God for all creation. St Francis is the patron saint of ecology – and Climate Crisis.

What if the Covid Crisis could help the Climate Crisis? Would you like a way to share ideas about that? What about a place to celebrate our beautiful county, where we can encourage each other to make it better when it gets degraded.

Somewhere to tell each other what we've learned from lock-down and what we want to hang on to: Where we can discover and resolve to make things different, how to help each other re-use and recycle, and reduce plastic use.

A place to encourage each other to make choices that are better for our planet, better for our health, better for our community, as we just try to cope in these uncertain days.

This year the sixth annual **Refugee Tales** festival will be online as the current coronavirus crisis means the walking-based aspect of the event cannot take place. Efforts to draw attention to the plight of those indefinitely detained will still take place.

Over the three days 3,4 & 5 July, Refugee Tales has invited authors, academics, and people with lived experience of detention and are experts by experience to give talks and readings. Each evening event will conclude with a musical performance.

Anna Pincus, director of **Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group**, said: "Taking Refugee Tales online, in this year of the pandemic, was a necessity. It wasn't what we planned at the beginning of the year, but we can see it is a wonderful opening up of the project to all.

People can join online from anywhere in the world. Hearing new tales is open to everyone and between events we'll be inviting people to walk in their locality according to government guidance at the time. We invite walkers to send in photos of **bridges** that they see to emphasise that we are very much connected wherever we are.

As we come out of lockdown, when our lives have been defined by confinement and uncertainty, perhaps now more than ever we can understand how it feels to be indefinitely detained."

Around sixty men are still being held at the Brook House Immigration Removal Centre at Gatwick Airport. Although there is a minimal chance of anyone being placed on a deportation flight, they are still being held in detention for an indefinite period. They are vulnerable in many ways, not the least being to Covid-19 infection.

There is currently an amendment to this bill being prepared, calling for a 28 day time limit and judicial oversight to detention.

Here is some news from the Trust Community Engagement Coordinator concerning the welfare of those who live in the safe houses at this time of Covid-19

"It has caused them a lot of anxiety and therefore has affected their mental health. They have been comforted by the fact that we are taking their temperatures on a daily basis and we now have some thermometers which are giving us correct readings.

To date we have not had any clients with a diagnosis out of the 116 beds we have on offer to clients across the 9 services.

We have upped the activities in all the houses to try and keep all clients as active as possible."

## **United against Coronavirus**



As we ourselves cope with coronavirus in the UK, we think of our sisters and brothers in developing countries who are facing this pandemic with fragile health systems, some of which have almost no intensive care beds or ventilators.

Food prices have already risen, borders have closed, the poorest are losing their jobs and income and there are wholesale shutdowns. Furthermore, inadequate healthcare, lack of access to washing facilities and limited ability to social distance will result in loss of life on an intolerable scale. The likely impact will be devastating.

- Cancel all **debt** payments by developing countries due in 2020 so that countries can spend money on much needed healthcare rather than debt repayments.
- Put plans in place to rebuild a fairer, more just society after the crisis so that the world's
  most vulnerable people can live in dignity and to restore our common home for future generations.
